W.1 Text Types and Purposes

- 1. Write opinion pieces that do the following:
 - a. Introduce the topic.
 - b. State an opinion.
 - c. Supply a reason for the opinion.
 - d. Provide some sense of closure.
- 2. Write informative/explanatory pieces that do the following:
 - a. Name a topic.
 - b. Supply some facts about the topic.
 - c. Provide a sense of closure.
- 3. Write narrative pieces that do the following:
 - a. Recount two or more appropriately sequenced events.
 - b. Include some details regarding what happened.
 - c. Use temporal words to signal event order.
 - d. Provide some sense of closure.

W.2 Production and Distribution of Writing

- 1. With guidance and support:
 - a. Focus on a topic.
 - b. Respond to questions and suggestions from peers.
 - c. Add details to strengthen writing as needed.
- 2. Use a variety of digital tools to produce and publish writing.

- 1. Participate in shared research and writing projects.

- 1. Demonstrate proper use of the following when writing or speaking:

 - e. Use frequently occurring adjectives.
 - f. Use frequently occurring conjunctions.
 - g. Use determiners.
 - h. Use frequently occurring prepositions.
 - i. Produce and expand different sentence types in response to prompts.
- Demonstrate proper use of the following capitalization, punctuation and spelling conventions when writing:
 - a. Capitalization of dates and names of people.
 - b. End punctuation for sentences
 - c. Commas in dates and to separate single words in a series
 - d. Conventional spelling
 - e. Phonetic spelling of untaught words..

I.3 Vocabulary Acquisition and Use

- Determine the meaning of grade level unknown and multiple-meaning words and phrases using the following strategies:
 - a. Use sentence level context clues.
 - b. Use frequently occurring affixes.
 - c. Use frequently occurring root words and their inflectional forms.
- With guidance and support from adults, demonstrate understanding of word relationships and identify slight differences in word meanings.
 - a. Sort words into categories (color, clothing...).
 - b. Define words by category and by one or more key attributes.
 - c. Identify real-life connections between words and their use.
 - Determine shades of meaning among verbs and adjectives differing in intensity (by defining or acting out the meaning).
- Obtain and use words and phrases learned through conversations, reading, shared reading, and text responses.

Speaking and Listening

- 1. Participate in conversations about grade level topics and texts by listening actively, building on others' comments, and asking relevant questions.
- 2. Ask and answer questions about key details in a text read aloud, information presented orally, or through other media.
